#### Dr. Darla K. Deardorff, UNESCO Chair on Intercultural Competence (September 2025)



How does your Chair approach the themes of inter-religious dialogue and intercultural understanding?

As the UNESCO Chair on Intercultural Competence, our work is deeply rooted in advancing both inter-religious dialogue and intercultural understanding. These are not peripheral themes—they are central to our mission. We focus on the fundamental question: What does it take for human beings to truly live well together across difference? This includes differences of religion, language,

ethnicity, race, gender, generation, and socio-economic background.

We explore the knowledge, skills, attitudes, values, and conditions necessary to foster genuine connection, empathy, and mutual respect. Inter-religious dialogue, in particular, offers a powerful lens through which to practice intercultural competence in real and meaningful ways, and we see it as a vital part of peacebuilding and ethical global engagement.

#### Is there anything you'd like to share with the Network?

We are truly grateful to be part of this inspiring Network and see immense potential in fostering stronger connections among UNESCO Chairs. One concrete idea would be to host quarterly recorded virtual gatherings where different Chairs share a brief overview of their current work, followed by 1–2 ideas for potential collaboration.

This would not only deepen our mutual understanding but also help identify shared priorities and innovative pathways for working together. We would welcome opportunities to engage in joint research, co-hosted events, or capacity-building initiatives that align with the values of intercultural competence and ethical engagement.




